Church Weekend Away at Abbot Hall, Grange-over-Sands

The Church Weekend Away retreated to the South Lakes in early October. The weather was most kind to us and a varied programme of arranged activities and free time and space was appreciated by all, as well as the excellent meals and hospitality provided by Abbot Hall, the Christian Guild Hotel at Kents Bank near Grange-over-Sands.

For the early arrivals, a walk beckoned on Friday – as Alison Twinn reports

'A group of seven followed one of Wainwright's lakeland walks from a layby just off the A590 towards Grange, not much above sea level up to Lord's Seat, the highest point on Whitbarrow about 800 feet above sea level! The 5½ mile walk began quite steeply though beautiful mixed woodland and continued upwards until the open grassland was reached. Then followed a more gentle undulating walk on grassy slopes scattered with tiny flowers, between limestone pavements and stunted junipers with their tops turned over almost at right-angles by the prevailing wind. Fortunately this was a calm day. Wainwright himself describes this part of the walk as 'exceedingly pleasant, in surroundings high above encircling valleys amid scenery that has no blemish. All is fair to the eye on Whitbarrow'. And so it was. After a packed lunch sitting with our backs to a wall we began the descent. This proved somewhat tricky in places clambering over loose stones and tree roots. However all arrived safely at the bottom and were refreshed with a cup of tea and home-made cakes outside a barn called the Hikers' Rest. Have you ever come across a 'help yourself, make your own tea and do your own washing-up. please, and put your money in the envelope provided and post it though the letterbox of the cottage next door' cafe? A wonderful day was enjoyed by everyone, and thanks go to Di and Richard who organised it.'

Everyone gathered for dinner, followed by a hilarious game of 'beetle' (arranged by Sue and Peter Levitt) during which we built churches rather than creating beetles. Some people acquitted themselves extremely well – a combination of paying attention, understanding the rules, keeping the dice on the chair, writing quickly and the luck of the dice: others – well, the least said the better. Prayers led by Ruth Lane and community singing (sacred and, as an innovation, secular) concluded the evening.

After Saturday morning prayers, led by Alison Twinn, we went our separate ways for a relaxing day. Many beauty spots, Lakeland sights and retail opportunities were sampled during the day.

Some of us reconvened after lunch to follow the westwards coastal path around the bay towards Humphrey Head: we made some progress but finally (and very sensibly) had to abandon our intended walk due to the extraordinarily high Spring tides which blocked our progress in a very watery sort of way.

The Church Council

The Council met on September 15th.

It decided that, at the stewards suggestion, the Carol singers would go out on 5 nights this year, and that there would be no carol singing in the evening after our carol service and St John's carol service (which in the past has been the 6th night). This means we could no longer cover the car route or Ashton Road. It was also decided not to provide refreshments on each night after the carol singing.

Children and Youth Work was discussed, with decisions that Andrea would be involved regularly in the craft activity for Norley@9, should hold a Christmas holiday club, and run a 6 week 'cookery club' in the new year in addition to her activities at Norley School.

The banner display at the front of the church would only be used intermittently to improve its impact, and that notices for special events, such as the Christingle and Carol Services would be displayed.

The accounts and reserve policy for the year to August 31 2010 were approved and accepted, with thanks to the treasurer and the auditor. Financial authorities were delegated to various Church officials and groups. The Schedule A and the property stewards schedule A supplement were accepted, with the priority property work sanctioned (see the Property Matters later in this edition).

Finally both the secretary (John Bell) and treasurer (Bruce Lane) offered their resignations having exceeded their allowed terms of office. Sue quoted from CPD (Standing Orders) which allowed John and Bruce to be reappointed for a further year – and the council approved their reappointments.

Ordination Service 2011

We were delighted to hear the wonderful news that the Rev'd Sue Levitt, our minister, is to be ordained at the Southport Methodist Conference next July. This will be a momentous occasion in Sue's life and ministry and we rejoice with her, Peter and her family that the Church has agreed to bring it forward from 2012 as was originally planned.

After their period on probation, ministers are received into the Full Connexion of the Methodist Church in Britain and ordained into the authorised ministry of the universal Church during the annual Methodist Conference. There is a subtlety here that perhaps needs explaining.

All ministers are 'received into Full Connexion' as a sign of the covenant relationship between themselves and the Church for the rest of their lives: this is a unique aspect of Methodism and has certain practical obligations on both sides. This event will happen at the end of the Sunday morning worship at Conference in Southport, as each minister (presbyter or deacon) is called by name by the Secretary of Conference and presents her/himself on the platform: when all are gathered, the President of Conference addresses them, reminding them of the meaning and significance of the occasion.

Later in the day (at places and times to be advertised), there will be a series of Ordination Services at different venues in the Southport area when the ordination into the ministry of the whole Church of God takes place. A small number of ministers are ordained at each service so that each can experience the unique moment of ordination in the sight of the whole congregation. These are simply magnificent occasions – I have often said that every Methodist should attend at least one in their lifetime - well now is your chance, and for a very special reason.

What do we know of the arrangements so far? The date most certainly will be Sunday July 3rd 2011. The Conference Sunday Worship including Reception into Full Connexion is open to anyone, as are the Ordination Services in the afternoon, but both will require tickets – they are extremely popular. We will ensure that details of venues and ticketing arrangements are advertised as soon as they become known. We are truly fortunate that Southport is so close for us and easily accessible there and back on the day.

Whilst decisions still have to be properly made, it seems highly probable that we shall not hold an evening service at Norley on that Sunday to encourage and enable as many as possible to support Sue and share in her Ordination Service.

May I urge you to do so – it will be a memorable and uplifting occasion.

Hubert Henry Cooper from all that I have heard about him is someone I am so sorry I never had the opportunity to meet For from all accounts and from the number of cards and letters Florence and Mike have received he was a lovely man... as one person put it 'a perfect gentle man'.

He was one of six children and lived all his life in the same family home in Moss Lane. He belonged to Bethel Methodist Church with the rest of his family until it closed but he never lost his faith, and knowing God's love and care in his own life, he wanted to share that love and care with all those that he knew and met.

He was devoted to his family and friends especially his brothers and his sisters. He lived with Florence (and with Mike when Florence married) and he called them 'the team'.... for that is how they lived and worked together... as a team... all for one and one for all supporting, encouraging, helping one another throughout their lives in the good times and the bad.

He was also very close to his sister Lucy and visited her every day to make sure she was OK and often took fruit and vegetables he'd grown sharing his abundance with her.

For Hubert loved his garden. He enjoyed sharing with God in His creation and he was good at it. Florence tells me that they were always self sufficient in fruit and vegetables due to Hubert's green fingered touch.

He was known as a good and faithful worker all his life from starting out in farming working for Dales, then moving on to working for Woodwards and then for Fred Stubbs as a labourer and then finally as a van driver travelling the country for Northwich Glass where he continued to work until he was 70. It is a tribute to him that people he worked for and alongside have all expressed a wish to be at his funeral to pay their respects to such a caring diligent man.

In his spare time (when he was not in the garden) Sport was his passion. He loved football and was an avid and ardent supporter of Manchester United... and nearer to home he helped out at Norley Football Club. For many years he marked out the ground for them each week and was on the committee helping in any way that he could. He enjoyed playing bowls and I am told was an excellent player and team member playing for Norley and always willing to help other teams when needed. He was also very keen on cricket.

But most of all he loved people and particularly his family... not just his sisters that I've already referred to but also his brothers... Ken and Billy who have preceded him in death and Ron who now lives in Ireland near to his son (with whom Hubert spoke often on the telephone) and also his extended family. He was always more concerned about them than he ever was himself. Florence told me of even in the last days when she and Mike went to visit him in hospital or in the nursing home he would always say, "Never mind about me just take care of yourselves.. I'm more worried about you." And when he was diagnosed he made Florence and Mike keep to themselves what was wrong because he didn't want people to be upset or worried on his account. For that was the caring, loving, self deprecating man Hubert was.

But now for Hubert the trials and tribulations of this world are over and death is past and I know he will have been received into the arms of his heavenly loving Father with the words,

'Well Done, my good and faithful servant'

Property Matters

The recent Church council set as priorities for the forthcoming year:-

- Fit rollers to the screen between the Church and the Open Door room.
- 2. Replace 88 worn out buttons on the organ Swell Octave coupler as recommended by Edwards Organ Builders at a cost of £480.
- **3.** Implement fast pay back items from the energy efficiency survey.

Since the last report in the summer edition of Outreach, the refurbishment of the lounge/Sunday School Room has been completed. Over the summer new skirting boards were fitted, the end wall papered, the woodwork and walls painted and a new carpet laid.

The large conifer was removed from the High Street side of the Church by a contractor, which should cure the blocking problem with the gutters. Thanks go to James Dale and John Dimelow for the removal of the felled tree. The shutters were removed, and the internal paintwork around the buttress repaired before the wedding of Craig and Dorothy. The organ had had a repair visit just before this, to sort out problems prior to the wedding, but the tree felling upset it, and 2 more visits were required to get it back in shape for the wedding.

The report of an energy efficiency survey carried out for the Methodist Church was also received. This identified a number of items that could be addressed to reduce our energy usage, and some of these will be taken up over the winter.

Since the Church council set the priorities for 2010/2011, the rollers have been fitted to the screen between the Open Door Room and the Church, which will make it much easier to open up the Open Door Room into the Church when required.

There will be a meeting of the Business & Management Committee on Dec 1 at Howell Croft, Cow Lane at 7.30pm to make plans to reduce our energy consumption. All are welcome to attend.
