The June Church Council ...

The June Church Council meeting was well attended. As is the normal routine, we use some time in the June meeting to receive reports from the groups and activities which regularly take place, and to consider our Christian Mission. The reports highlighted the range of activities which we organise involving the local community (including our Pastoral Visiting, the Craft Club, Open Door Lunches, Thursday Club and Wednesday Walks), as well as support to those living in the area (via the Food Bank) and those in need who live much further away – including the support to the recent Christian Aid appeal.

Andrew reported that he continues to have conversations with Rev Hilary Merrington from St John's and the local school. We agreed that once a permanent appointment is made to St John's we hope to develop our engagement and fellowship with them, including our outreach to the school. A separate meeting was arranged to take place in July, to review our outreach activities (see separate report for details about this).

Andrew also reported that he is liaising with our friends from Acton Bridge to find a suitable date when he can formally transfer their membership to Norley.

Our Circuit Steward, Simon, updated the meeting on the planned merger of the Chester and Delamere Circuit with the Runcorn Circuit from September. Joint meetings are already taking place. The new Circuit will be known as the North Cheshire Circuit and two new Ministers plus an active Deacon will be welcomed in September. This will mean that the Circuit will be fully staffed with Presbyters.

Two fundraising events were noted: The Open Day (which took place in June) and an Autumn Concert which is due to take place on October 12th. As well as being enjoyable social occasions it is hoped that as fundraisers, these events will compensate for the Safari Supper, which has been cancelled, and Carol Singing around the village.

Other items discussed at the meeting were:

- That the automatic defibrillator, to which we have contributed, is now installed by the Village Hall. Two further defibrillators will be installed around the village in due course.
- Bruce will explore the possibility of Willersley castle in Derbyshire for the Church weekend away in 2020
- The need to purchase bags for the collection as the new £10 and £5 notes are difficult to control on the collection plates!

Church Strategy Day

Following the departure of Andrea, our Families worker, in October 2018, the Church Leadership team and Church Council had agreed that we should set aside time to reflect on our outreach and consider future activity. We finally held our outreach strategy meeting on July 9th.

It was a disappointingly small meeting with just 7 members attending plus our Minister, Andrew. The discussion paper 'Reaffirming Our Calling: the future call of the Methodist Church' refers to outreach in a number of sections:

'Sharing the gospel of Christ with those in our local communities so as to lead people to make a commitment to Christ'

'...being a confident Church acting prophetically in our own connexion with ecumenical and other partners.

'To be an inclusive and diverse Church by extending our reach and engagement with those who feel marginalized..'

Despite the small numbers, we had a very useful and honest discussion. We initially considered the range of our regular current activities, which we agreed are probably resilient for the next few years, and the activities we organise from time to time such as music events, Christmas Tree and Flower Festivals. Many of the activities successfully reach out to those who live in Norley and the surrounding areas who don't normally attend our Church services and particularly the bigger events can be an effective way of establishing an initial contact.

We noted that we seem to be more successful in engaging with the 'mature' population rather than younger families in the village. The link with the school has diminished since Andrea left her post last year. Change at the Anglican Church has led to our local young families losing their link with either of the Churches in the village and this is a 'gap'.

A number of ideas were discussed as to what we could do to increase our outreach and engagement with possibilities including Family Breakfasts, Messy Church, School Clubs, Coffee Mornings and running an Alpha Course in the village. The big issue we have is capacity to provide and support any additional activities. We concluded therefore that at the present time we are not able to increase the range of outreach activities to try and engage the local community – particularly young families.

In terms of what we could do, a couple of proposals were made which seem to be 'do-able': These are:

- To increase the publicity for our current activities via the Norley News – perhaps running regular features on some of the activities. As well as attendees, through publicity there may be local people who would be interested in getting involved as additional helpers.
- For Andrew to consider the possibility of running themed services to celebrate some of the local groups and activities.

These will be picked up for further discussion at the Church Leadership Team meeting and future Church Council meetings.

First Wednesday Walks

The June Wednesday Walk led by Richard was from the village of Saughall just north of Chester, an area which none of the walkers were familiar with. Before the walk we enjoyed coffee and for some, a cake, at Lynda's Tea Room (to be recommended if you are ever in Saughall). We then set off for a short two and a half mile stroll - How did it take us over two hours? It was over pleasant farmland and through beautiful old, mainly oak, woodland. Part of it was along the old medieval bank of the Dee estuary, although the present river is now some two miles away. The walk was mainly flat although in one place, we did have to struggle down and up the bank. We eventually found ourselves at the site of Shotwick Castle which was originally built by Hugh Lupus the 1st Earl of Chester in the 11th Century to command the crossing of the river by the tidal ford at this point. It was built apparently on a grand scale, but there are now only earthworks to be seen, all the stonework having been plundered many years ago. We then made our way back (slowly) to Saughall via a different route. On the way back to Norley we stopped at The Hornsmill for some well earned lunch.

It's that time of year again – to start thinking of all the exciting things we can put in a shoebox to go to a child who may not get any other Christmas present. There are ideas below, and information on things that can no longer go in shoeboxes, and some new things that are allowed.

Exciting things

WOW TOYS

Include items that children will immediately embrace such as dolls or stuffed toys, toy trucks, harmonica, yo-yo, skipping rope, ball, small puzzles, wind up torch, slinky spring, marbles, matchbox cars, etc.

COOL GEAR

Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set.

Useful things

SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring books etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS

Toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Good News – these can now go in shoeboxes

The good news is that we can now put hand knitted and filled toys in boxes, small containers with liquids – like make up, roll on deodorant etc. Everything has to be new or AS GOOD AS NEW. Christmas cards and personal messages some of which may get a response from the recipient

Bad News – these can't go in shoeboxes

Due to more stringent import regulations, toothpaste, sweets and chocolates can no longer be included in shoeboxes.

As before:- used or damaged items, war related items such as toy guns, play soldiers or knives; food items; aerosols, medicines; anything of a political, racial or religious nature; sharp objects; glass containers, mirrors or fragile items; playing cards of the 4-suit variety; clothing other than as listed above.

Food Bank

This is just one of many real life stories taken from the Food Bank website which demonstrates the vital support role played by the Food Banks in supporting people through extremely difficult times..

Richard's Story

“Without the foodbank, I don't think I would be here today.”

Having worked in the police force for six years, followed by 12-years in the Royal Military Police, Richard, 49, from New Milton, had always considered himself fit and healthy. However, this all changed when a chest infection quickly developed into a heart condition and he suffered from two major strokes followed by 19 mini strokes, leaving him unable to work.

Richard's situation deteriorated further when he separated from his wife and moved out of their family home, where, unfortunately due to this change of address his Employment Support Allowance (ESA) was delayed. As a result of his serious heart condition Richard needs 35 tablets a day, but the cost of travelling to collect his prescriptions left him without enough money for food, and his local Citizens Advice Bureau referred him to the foodbank.

Although Richard admits he never expected to be in this situation, on arrival he was put at ease straight away. “The volunteers were fantastic, offering a chat and a shoulder to cry on. I suffer from depression as well and without the foodbank I don't think I would be here today,” he said.

Richard looks forward to seeing his 10-year-old daughter every weekend but admits he has skipped meals on a few occasions so she can eat. He explains: “It's a really bad situation that people have to decide whether they can feed themselves, feed their children or put the heating on. It's a case of having to budget or having to go without.”

At the moment things are still tough for Richard, he's on the waiting list for a heart transplant and will be on medication for the rest of his life, but he's grateful that the foodbank is available if he ever needs some extra help.

Your donations of food really do help and make a difference to people's lives, so 'thank you' to everyone for the continued generous donations. Our most recent donation for June / July yielded almost 40kg of food. We will post updates in the weekly notices, but in the meantime, additional information for food items and toiletries that are needed can be found on the food bank website: <https://westcheshire.foodbank.org.uk>

Solar Panels Update

We received a cheque for £765.49 for electricity generation in the 3 months up to 7 July, the highest quarterly cheque we have ever received. In that period we generated 1365 Kwh, also the highest quarterly total ever. Clearly the panels are continuing to operate well since resolution under warrantee of the inverter hiccup.

The treasurer has estimated that we lost £850 of income due to the failure, but was are now back on track.

So far in 7 years and 3 months we have generated 24423Kwh and received £12,278 return for our investment of £7,540.

Only 17years and 9 months income to go!

Property Matters

There has been little property activity again in the last 6 months - retiling of the second toilet still awaits time from the Property Steward.

The problems with the dishwasher turned out to be leaks on the peristaltic pump that delivers the dishwasher fluid. The leaks were shorting out the machine. Once fixed, the dishwasher continued to operate successfully until it ran out of dishwasher fluid, and more supplies had to be ordered. Since installation and clearance of a blockage on the pump delivery side, the machine has performed satisfactorily. The dishwasher is six years old now, and has proved expensive to maintain, but without it the Open Door lunches would be more difficult. Possibly it should be replaced at the next failure.

A revised specification has been drawn up with Molly Mop, the church cleaners, and agreed with Kelly, who proved to be a willing and efficient contact at Molly Mop, but who left, we suspect for a better job, before implementation of the new schedule. Its implementation will lead to an increase in our costs, but keep the church at a much higher standard of cleanliness. Repeated emails to Molly Mop have failed so far to get the new schedule underway.
