This is the very best time of the year I think. Spring is in the air and we have Easter to look forward to. The events of Easter are given extra significance because they follow on from the terrible happenings of Good Friday when death appeared to have the last word. On Easter Sunday God has the last word and it is a resounding "NO!" to all that is harmful to human life followed by a resounding "YES!" to new life through resurrection!

It is the news that something has happened which has changed everything for everyone. Easter is about new life.

That life is represented by the Easter eggs that we share and enjoy. It is reflected in the warming days of spring, with bulbs breaking through and birds starting to sing. The exact date of Easter may vary but it is, at least in our part of the world, fixed in that time when new life is all around us. We all know that the new born are fragile and vulnerable, whether we are talking about chicks or children. There will always be times when new life is crushed by the weight of expectations or the fallen brokenness that we live within. It looked to many as if the new life that Jesus sought to bring had been cut down when he was crucified on the cross. But then there was the empty tomb.

Easter is about new life.

Despite the passage of two thousand years there are still signs of the new life of Easter all around us. I see it in changed lives and changed communities: people and places where love and forgiveness are made more evident than they otherwise would be.

Let us make the most of Easter again this year; allowing the story to amaze and thrill us! We will not fully understand it this side of heaven but that must not prevent us from opening our hearts and minds to the greatest miracle wrought by God the creator who loves us so much He not only gives us new life but also new life in Christ.

All the joy and blessing of Easter to you.

Our donations to the Foodbank are greatly appreciated and make a difference to the lives of local people who are in crisis. At the present time the Foodbank is particularly low on supplies of fruit juice, UHT milk and sugar and so donations of these items are particularly welcome - as well as food which can be easily be prepared with limited cooking facilities and personal toiletries.

Half-year Financial Report

Overall, the church finances are in a satisfactory position at the end of February, which is half-way through the Methodist year.

Income in the first half-year has been about £1600 higher than we budgeted, for various reasons, not least the monies raised from special events such as the Harvest Supper, pre-Christmas coffee morning and sale and the January church party. It is good to report that weekly collections have exceeded expectations too. However, we must remember that the special events were held mainly as a result of deferring the Flower Festival until September 20216, which falls in the financial year 2016-17.

Expenditure was about £900 less than we budgeted, again for a variety of reasons, including the deferral of garden works and gutter repairs which will be carried out in the second half of the year.

It is anticipated that income in the second half should be close to budget, with the major exception of the Flower Festival, though much depends on the surplus generated by the Safari Supper in June. We hope for a sunny and enjoyable evening too!

So long as no unexpected property emergencies occur, it is planned to put the annual budget provision for such things (£800 this year) into a reserve each year to cover the cost of external decoration of the church premises, probably in 2018.

The current outlook, as ever with the disclaimer that things can always change, is that we shall record an overall surplus of about £1200 in the whole year, including the above (hopefully unused) emergency provision, which will be channelled into the external painting reserve.

The February meeting of the Church Council approved a budget for the year September 2016 to August 2017 so that we can have a clear view of the financial challenges ahead of us. This shows income and expenditure in balance at almost exactly £25,000. The income will continue to depend heavily on the financial success of special events such as the Flower Festival in September 2016 and the Safari Supper in the summer of 2017. The main item of property expenditure will be the renewal of the lighting in the Church. We also are required to repay the loan received from the Chester and Stoke-on-Trent Methodist District towards the cost of the solar panels: this is in two equal amounts of £1250 in March 2017 and March 2018.

The Church Council agreed to make donations of £150 each to the Englesea Brook Chapel and Museum of Primitive Methodism (just south of Crewe and well worth a visit from Spring onwards) and the Methodist Fund for the Support of Presbyters and Deacons (FSPD). The FSPD is a connexional (i.e. across Britain) benevolent fund which provides for emergency financial needs of Methodist ministers, both presbyters and deacons, and their immediate dependants, whether still in active ministry or retired and it relies strongly on donations such as ours.

Finally, may I offer the fulsome gratitude of the Church to Mrs Barbara Garner who has acted as our envelope scheme and gift-aid secretary for well over twenty years and is now stepping down. Barbara's quietly diligent and efficient work, keeping immaculate and accurate records, goes almost unnoticed, but it is a vital role that she has fulfilled mostly behind scenes without fuss or ever seeking acclaim. We place on record our huge indebtedness to Barbara for her years of splendid service – very many thanks indeed! *John Bell Church Treasurer*

Property Matters

Activities since the last report have been:-

The glass doors have been adjusted for a second time by Yoxall free of charge and are functioning satisfactorily.

Diffusers for the kitchen and Sunday School fluorescent lights were purchased and installed to complete the 2014/15 planned safety recommendation from the quinquennial inspection.

James Dale has fixed the main gate so that it now opens properly.

The church lights renewal had been deferred to 2017/18 but deterioration of a second fluorescent light above the organ indicates it should be brought forward again. A suspended led fluorescent plan from Tony Preston was rejected by the Church Leadership Team in favour of a spotlight solution similar to that adopted at Kelsall. The property steward has visited Kelsall, and is currently getting proposals costed. The Church Council authorised up to £1300 expenditure to be approved by the Church Leadership Team for this work.

The main unplanned issue in this period has been the performance of the dishwasher, which failed to clean dishes (its primary function). The machine supplier sent a repair company, Crystal Tech, to repair the fault on a prepaid visit, where a grumpy and rude engineer turned up a day late and failed to repair the machine or correctly diagnose the fault and declared the water pump was open circuit and needed to be replaced without taking the machine apart. The property steward on return from his holidays organised two visits from what turned out to be an excellent engineer, and the dishwasher is now working far better than ever before. However over £500 was extracted from us by Crystal Tech for this work. A claim was lodged with the MD for the £300 cost of unnecessary parts replacements, but a whitewash reply was received from the tech service manager. Our dissatisfaction will continue to be pursued but it looks unlikely we will get any recompense.

Work on the Maddock's Hill side of the garden has not progressed – time availability and the weather have delayed progress realistically until spring. Most of the money authorised on this phase (\pounds 250) has been spent but not yet billed.

John Dimelow's schedule has not allowed him to complete installation of the gutter lining and leaf guards, purchased last year. The job turned out to be much more difficult than expected, and time availability and weather have prevented completion. Again it looks as if this will not be completed until spring.
