

Dear Friends,

As I write, the teenagers from our Methodist churches in Norley and Frodsham are sharing in "*Life Together – An Experiment in Christian Community Living*". From Wednesday through to Sunday, during a normal week of school, college or work, church becomes our home as we explore what it means to be followers of Jesus Christ in the context of normal life.

We share meals, go to work, find time to do our homework and attend our normal weekly activities. Each day begins and ends with prayers. We begin the day committing it to God and asking for God's guidance and at the end of the day reflect on the day that has past.

Our *Life Together* is inspired by the experience and writings of the theologian and anti-Nazi dissident Dietrich Bonhoeffer, who led a seminary in Finkelwalde (now Stettin), Poland before the outbreak of the second world war. Bonhoeffer's book *Life Together* was based on his experiences. The students of this first *Life Together* community were amongst those who led the Confessing Church so called because they confessed Jesus as Lord (and not Hitler). As a result, the seminary was declared illegal and many of its students and leaders were sent to concentration camps. Bonhoeffer himself was executed at Flossenbug in 1945.

Bonhoeffer wrote that community was not a "given", it's a gift of God and something that has to be celebrated and which needs to be nurtured. Christian community is not one of isolation but of engagement. "It is only by fully living in the world that [people] find faith". The intention of our *Life Together* is to model community which celebrates God's gifts whilst living in midst of the world.

Let's continue to build up our deeply subversive common life together that we might model lives that reflect the suffering love of God in Jesus Christ.

## Pastoral Piece

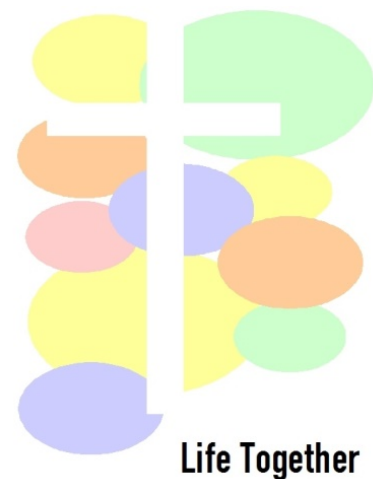

## **Property Matters**

There has been little property activity in the last 6 months other than the completion of the retiling of the smaller toilet. The retiling of the larger toilet awaits the availability of time from the property steward!

As reported in the last Outreach the inverter had failed on the solar panel system probably in April but was replaced free of charge under the 10 year warrantee when we noticed in September. We were compensated £80 for the lost income between reporting the failure and the replacement being installed. The panels are working again well now, but they do not generate a huge amount of power in winter.

Problems have arisen recently with the dishwasher shorting out the circuit – almost certainly due to failure of one of the water heating elements – and the replacement element is on its way. This machine has been very expensive to maintain and is about 6 year's old – perhaps it is time to think about replacing it at the next failure. *Bruce Lane*

## The Circuit Structure from 1 September

The Chester and Delamere Forest circuit has approved its merger with the Runcorn circuit from 1 September 2019 to form the North Cheshire circuit. It has been decided that the finances of the two circuits will continue to run separately for the 2019/2020 connexional year.

The North Cheshire circuit has been successful in the stationing process, and 2 new presbyters and a Deacon will be starting with us in September in the new circuit. Neil Stacey, the superintendent, said securing these appointments had been much better than he had expected as there had been no guarantees due to demand elsewhere.

The new presbyters are **Alison Crookes** (who will replace the minister for the Runcorn churches) and **Joanna Brown** (subject to conference approval in June) who will fill the vacancy left by the retirement of David Speed in the Chester & Delamere Forest circuit. Joanna has a penchant for rural ministry, and will take pastoral charge for the 7 smaller rural churches in the current Chester & Delamere Forest circuit. The Deacon, *Tim Coleman*, will work in the Runcorn part of the new circuit.

Neil Stacey outlined the shape of the new Circuit and Ministerial responsibility from September 2019:-

- Joanna Brown - Tarvin, Kelsall, Mickle Trafford, Christleton, Rowton, Oakmere, Bunbury & Tiverton.
- Christine Dutton - Wesley and Saughall
- David Goodwin - Caldley Valley, Hoole and Garden Lane
- Andrew Emison - Frodsham and Norley
- David Bintliff - Helsby, Hurst and Blakelees
- Neil Stacey – Superintendency plus responsibility for Saltney and Bretton

# Christian Aid

## We believe in life before death

**Last year (2018) - Norley village raised an amazing £2,176 which contributed to the overall final total of £8.5m. The money went towards funding Christian Aid's programme of storm-proof house construction in Haiti. Thank you to all the volunteer door-to-door collectors and the generosity of the people of Norley.**

**Christian Aid Week in 2019 will be from 12-18th May. The focus this year is on maternity care in Sierra Leone.**

You may remember that in May 1998, 70,000 people took to the streets of Birmingham to form a human chain. As part of the Jubilee Debt Campaign, Christian Aid called on world leaders to cancel the debt for poorest countries. 21 years on from that historic campaign a new debt crisis is looming. In Sierra Leone, communities are recovering from the Ebola virus, which claimed the lives of 4,000 people and 10% of the healthcare workforce.

Now, our sisters and brothers in Sierra Leone are suffering from poor healthcare – in particular in the maternity field. The chances of dying in childbirth are so high now as Sierra Leone lacks the funds to provide basic healthcare services - proper clinics, health training, ambulances etc. You'd expect government funding to cut in but there is a lack of funding as the Government of Sierra Leone was given loans to help to cope with the Ebola crisis that they are now expected to pay back.

Is it right that Sierra Leone has to pay off debts which come from a major crisis like Ebola, while its people struggle to access even basic healthcare? The UK Government can stand together with the people of Sierra Leone. As the fourth largest shareholder in the IMF it has significant influence. Christian Aid believes that the people of Sierra Leone must be able to pay for their own health services - without being saddled with debt.

Let's stand together for dignity, equality and justice this Christian Aid Week. If you'd like to help by being a Christian Aid volunteer in the village of Norley - contact:
