People in our churches tell me, often in private, that they don't know how to pray. They listen to prayers in church or read them in books and feel that they cannot match the required standard.

That's not how God sees it. Remember the story in Luke 18:9-14 about the Pharisee and the Tax Collector? The story is about humility and awareness that all of us are incomplete. The lofty words of the Pharisee, the religious professional, are contrasted with the simple, honest, raw words of the Tax Collector and it is the tax collector that wins Jesus' affirmation.

When we pray, we pray in the "name" of Jesus. To pray in the "name" of Jesus is to pray through him and in his character. That means that we can stumble through our prayers, rephrase, and start again. Through Jesus, we like Moses, may dare to speak to God "as one speaks to a friend" (Exodus 33:11). I believe that when we pray, we can be confident that God, the creator of the universe, is hanging on our every word!

Thy Kingdom Come (<https://www.thykingdomcome.global/>) is an ecumenical initiative to focus all of God's people on prayer and takes place over the eleven days between Ascension Day (30th May) and Pentecost (9th June). All over the country there will be opportunities for us as individuals and communities to share in prayer.

Some of you reading this will feel that through ill health or infirmity you are not able to contribute much to the life of our church. Nothing could be further from the truth. There is work for you to do. Please would you pray for our fellowship, the other churches and the life of Norley and its surrounding towns and villages?

In turn, may we pray for you? If you have a prayer request, please contact your pastoral visitor or myself with your request and your guidance as to what level of detail you would like us to share in public worship.

The first Church Council meeting for 2019 was chaired by our Minister, Andrew. It was a full agenda and there are updates on financial matters and property matters included elsewhere in this magazine. Key additional items discussed at the meeting were:

- That the Christmas celebrations – both the singing evening and the carol service had been successful, and it was good to see friends from the local community and families of our regular attenders at both events. Andrew is hoping that we can be involved with St John's and the school in some 'joined up' Christmas outreach this year.
- A couple of notable dates from the Spiritual Committee report were the 'Welcome Service' for new Circuit staff and to mark the merger of the our Circuit with the Runcorn Circuit on 31st August, to become North Cheshire Circuiy. This service will be held at the Heath, Runcorn and will be led by the new District Chair, Rev Helen Kirk. Helen's own welcome service will take place on 30th August at Tunstall. Harvest Festival will take place on 29th September with Andrew covering the morning service. Further details will be included in the notices nearer to the time.
- We have been very pleased to welcome friends from Acton Bridge Methodist Church into our fellowship at Norley.
- It was agreed that instead of the Safari Supper this year we will hold two alternative fundraising events: a fundraising Church Open Day on Saturday June 15th and a musical evening in the autumn (date to be confirmed).
- Fundraising: We have supported the appeal for funds to purchase three defibrillators to be located across Norley and we also noted that Michael Gough has taken over as the co-ordinator for the Christian Aid appeal across the village.

The next Church Council meeting will be held on Wednesday June 12th and an additional evening meeting will be held in July to discuss our outreach activities – further details about both will be included in the weekly notices.

After the inverter hiccup the panels are performing well, and we have just received a cheque for £431 for generation from 6 Jan to 9 April, bringing our receipts to almost £11,600 in 7 years of operation for our outlay of £7540.

Claire celebrated Holy Communion to conclude the service.

1st Wednesday Walks



Church Outreach Strategy Meeting

Please come along to the Church on the evening of July 9 to share your views on how the Church should take forward its mission in Norley. Following the end of Andrea's work at the school and the changes at St John's, we need to decide where we focus our activities in the village to fulfil our calling. The Annual Church Meeting and the church leadership team both felt this meeting should be our first step into the future. Do come with your ideas. The meeting will be from 7.30pm until 9pm.

Last year (2018) - Norley village raised an amazing £2,176 which contributed to the overall final total of £8.5m. The money went towards funding Christian Aid's programme of storm-proof house construction in Haiti. Thank you to all the volunteer door-to-door collectors and the generosity of the people of Norley.

The focus this year is on maternity care in Sierra Leone. In Sierra Leone, communities are recovering from the Ebola virus, which claimed the lives of 4,000 people and 10% of the healthcare workforce! The country is having to repay crippling debts to the World Bank and our sisters and brothers in Sierra Leone are suffering from poor healthcare – particularly in the field of maternity care.

The chances for a mother and baby of dying in childbirth are so much higher now as Sierra Leone lacks the funds to provide basic maternity services - proper clinics, health training, ambulances etc. In this day and age, no woman should die in childbirth! So, this year your Christian Aid Week donations will go towards supporting maternity care in Sierra Leone. Not only that, Christian Aid is stepping up the pressure on the World Bank to 'drop the debt' for Sierra Leone - most of which was accrued in coping with the Ebola crisis.

Financial Report

The church's financial position is in good order, with no immediate cause for concern. We continue to rely on gift-aid refunds from HMRC at the level of just over £5000 per year within a total income of £26,000. The main unknown is the increase in the circuit assessment – the amount we pay each quarter to the circuit to cover the costs of ministry and oversight – as the circuit is reviewing the basis of assessment for 2019-20. One of the main determinants is church membership and Norley has sustained this more successfully than many other churches: we must therefore pay our realistic share. Assessment accounts for about 70% of expenditure.

In the current year, 2018-19, we have fulfilled our commitment to the community by funding the cabinet in which the defibrillator will be installed at the Village Hall at a cost of £314. As a result of the period of undetected failure of the solar panel inverter, we shall receive a lower refund this year than we did in 2017-18. The Church Council decided that, as the Safari Supper was not a practical proposition this year, we would hold a Gift Day on June 15th at which donations for church funds would be most gratefully received.

As is our custom, the Annual Church Meeting agreed donations to external charities and organisations – Norley News £100, the Marie Curie Foundation £200, the Poppy Appeal (Royal British Legion) £100 and the Cheshire Agricultural Chaplaincy £200.

Over the past 10 years, the Annual Church Meeting has made donations averaging £600 per year to 23 different charities and organisations, of which only 6 have received more than one: the main beneficiaries have been Northwich Samaritans £650, the Alzheimers Society £500, Norley News £400, Sanctus (the Stoke based refugee charity) £400, the Marie Curie Foundation £350, the British Legion Poppy Appeal £300 and All We Can (formerly the Methodist Relief and Development Fund) £300.

A balanced budget for 2019-20 has been prepared. Thanks to the careful stewardship and maintenance of our premises we have no major concerns about property expenditure and we are making financial provision for the external painting which will be required within a couple of years or so.

There has been a 22 per cent increase in the number of emergency food parcels given to local people in the last year. West Cheshire Foodbank, which distributes food parcels to individuals and families throughout Chester and Ellesmere Port, has given out 9651 food parcels in the past 12 months

The three day emergency food parcels were distributed to local people between April 2018 – March 2019. And a staggering 3552 of the recipients – more than a third – were children.

The local food bank's figures feed into a larger national picture with a record increase in food bank use across the UK reported this week by the Trussell Trust.

West Cheshire Foodbank is backing calls from the Trussell Trust to ensure the benefits system is able to protect people from poverty.

The figures from West Cheshire Foodbank are a 22% increase on the same period last year. The charity believes a large part of the local increase is due to people struggling with continued issues with benefit payments/issues such as the five-week wait for Universal Credit.

Ian Oulton, Foodbank Trustee said:

No one in the Chester and Ellesmere Port area should need a food bank's help and we want to see an end to local people needing emergency food at all. It doesn't have to be this way – our benefits system is supposed to protect us all from being swept into poverty. Universal Credit should be part of the solution but currently the five week wait is leaving many without enough money to cover the basics.

“Until we reach a future where food banks are no longer needed, we'll continue to provide vital support when it matters most. We're dedicated to ensuring that people in our community without enough money for food are able to access emergency support. Our vital work in the community has only been possible in the last year because of the

incredible generosity shown by our dedicated volunteers and local people and businesses in donating food, time and funds.”

West Cheshire Food Bank is self-funding – relying on donations of foodstuffs and cash to cover the £60k annual running costs. Money has to be raised to fund the rented warehouse space, a van to pick up donated food and deliver to distribution centres, and overheads including utilities and insurance.
