Dear All,

Christmas and carols go together. You can't have one without the other. It would require a high degree of ingenuity for anyone to get through the Christmas season without hearing a carol – and probably singing one, too. They're on the speakers in the supermarket, they're on the radio, carol singers come round the streets singing them, and, of course, there's the church carol service.

Most of us could name lots of them:- Hark the Herald, Good King Wenceslas, In the Bleak Midwinter, Away in a Manger, Once in Royal David's City . . . and so on. Some of those carols are very old, some relatively modern. They're perhaps the only Christian songs we actually know the words of – but familiarity can breed if not contempt, then at least inattention.

Occasionally in those familiar lines we sing absolute nonsense: 'In the bleak midwinter, frosty wind made moan, earth stood hard as iron' – in Bethlehem? 'Little Lord Jesus, no crying he makes' – so the baby Jesus wasn't human after all? 'And io, io, io by priest and people sungen'? No, not a bad case of the stutters, but a medieval carol writer's mischievous description of the mumbo-jumbo of incomprehensible Latin in church.

We've been spared other bafflement by the work of editors. Charles Wesley's first line was originally 'Hark how all the welkin rings' – no 'herald angels'. 'Welkin' comes from an Old English word meaning 'heaven' and has absolutely nothing to do with shell-fish!

But enough of problems. On the whole carols are wonderfully clear in their message and profoundly moving in a simple and touching way. The last verse of Once in Royal David's City always moves me:

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing by,
we shall see him; but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high.

Trust Mrs Alexander to get it exactly right.

And Christina Rossetti's last verse, asks a question so searching that her meteorological musings fade into thin air:

What shall I give him, poor as I am?
if I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb;
if I were a wise man, I would do my part;
yet what I can I give him – give my heart.

I wish everyone a Happy and Blessed Christmas.

After a good lunch at the Sun Trevor Inn, we returned to Trevor along the canal towpath. Reaching the basin, we enjoyed ice cream (in November!) before driving back to Norley.

The October church council approved the accounts for the year presented by John Bell.

The budget for the coming year was reviewed following the moving of the Flower Festival to the 2016/17 financial year, and alternative income generating activities were approved to fill the gap – a coffee morning and sale of items (on Dec 5) and a New Year party (on Jan 30) and the idea of a sponsored walk by the walking group.

The property check list and property report presented by Bruce Lane were approved, and the proposed property expenditure on the rest of the garden work and the church gutters was authorised.

Dates were set for the 2015 Safari Supper (June 18), and it was decided to return to Beth Eden in 2016 for a Church Weekend away.

Currently the church has 49 members.

Financial Report – steady as she goes!

The October Church Council meeting approved the audited Church accounts for the Connexional year September 1st 2014 to August 31st 2015, with our gratitude to Richard Ramsbottom who very kindly acted as the independent examiner for another year. The accounts and Standard Forms were duly despatched to the Circuit Treasurer – and Norley once again won the gold award for the first submission!

At £10,869, the balances in the accounts were healthy at the year-end, a little more than last time, and almost giving us the level agreed to be held as a reserve in case of emergency. The Methodist Church requires all churches to have and declare a reserves policy.

With an income in the year of £27,461 and expenditures of £25,567 we were usefully able to add to the level of reserves. Several items, mainly of property-related costs, came in at less than budget, thus giving a saving in the year. During the year, we were thrilled to be able to install and dedicate the new front doors. We are most grateful to everyone who gave so generously to enable the full costs of £2215 to be met exactly after gift-aid was reclaimed.

As the Treasurer often reminds the Church Council however, our income is hugely dependent on special events which demand lots of work and commitment from various people – the Safari Supper (£1254 in 2014-15), Carol-singing (£455), Open Door lunches (£957) and, from time to time, celebratory festivals – in 2014-15 the Christmas Tree Festival (£857) and New Year Party (£218). Thus some £3741 was raised from special events – a major contribution to sustaining the Church's financial viability. Also, the investment in the solar panels gave an income of £1723 and gift-aid reclaimed netted £4675 (including the amount on front door donations).

A realistic balanced budget was prepared for 2015-16, with income and expenditure of £24,400 or so. Various special enjoyable (and fund-raising) events are being planned for the year so that we may achieve this, but also to begin to save up to £1000 per year for a few years to build up a reserve to cover the costs of the external redecoration of the Church buildings within the next 5 years .

The message is 'steady as she goes!'
